Circuit Judge Third Judicial District, Candidate for Re-election

Judge W. M. Ramsey says:

Their Boomerang

As a trusted clerk in the bank, he was a splendid clerk. As state land agent he was a splendid official. For his work, he was commended in the highest terms by every newspaper in Oregon. There was never a word of scandal in the office after he entered it, nor since.

As railroad commissioner, he was a splendid commissioner. There were complaints of brutal treatment of livestock in transit over the railroads; he took a practical man's way of learning the facts.

He did not ride over the line in a palace car as railroad commissioners often do. He dressed himself as a stockman, and as such rode the length of the east side line in charge of several cars of stock. It gave him actual knowledge of conditions and resulted in intelligent action.

When there were reports that the Corvallis & Eastern railroad tracks were unsafe, West took no man's word for it. The safety of the traveling public was at stake. With a hatchet and other tools, he set out afoot and walked the length of the line, testing the ties, [digging into bridge timbers, examining culverts and making a tedious but effective personal survey of the road. When his work, requiring several days, was finished, he personally knew conditions. It was a practical man's practical way of gaining practical information.

In the same way, West examined the west side road from Corvallis to Portland. There had been an accident to a train, and to make sure that the traveling public was protected, he walked the entire distance, examining every tie, rail, bridge and culvert in the track. When or where was so much interest ever taken by a railroad commissioner in the welfare and safety of the public?

Such is West. Every act in his career has been an example of how to make good. His every public movement has been an instance of integrity and effectiveness. It is only by such acts that he could have risen from a delivery boy to popular favorite for governor of his state. It is a beautiful testimonial to our national life that such a course opens the way for the lowliest boy to the highest place. No

more splendid encouragement can be given to boys and men in any walk than by electing such a man to the governorship of the state.

It is for these reasons that the pusillanimous attempt to besmirch Mr. West with the mileage incident will react with deadly effect against those who perpetrated the outrage and give votes by the hundred to the man whose life is an open book, and who as delivery boy, railroad commissioner or in any other capacity invariably made good. —Oregon Sunday Journal

OUR PORTLAND LETTER

Portland, Or.,—Oregon not only raises the best sheep in the Union, but they will compare favorably with any in the world, in the opinion of Geo. W. McKnight, of Vale, president of the Oregon Wool Growers Association. He expects this fact will be demonstrated at the coming convention of the National Wool Growers Association which opens in Portland on January 4.

"We shall have the greatest sheep show ever held in Oregon," he said. "Our breeders will have a great chance to show their stock, and if we win in the coming competition they can safely take their sheep anywhere in the world."

The Portland convention of the National Wool Growers Association, which is the oldest livestock organization in the United States, will be the biggest in the history of that organization. The state association of wool growers will meet in Portland just before the National convention, the exact date to be determined later.

Oregon's apple show is receiving very wide attention. Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Ry., is taking interest in the coming exhibit and offers a cash prize of \$250 for the best exhibit of apples from any district tributary to the Great Northern. Two cash prizes of \$250 each will be presented for the best exhibits of apples. Fruit growers of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana will be eligible in these two classes.

Portland has accomplished more hard-surface paving since the first of January than any other city of like population in the United States, 50 miles of hard-surface streets having been laid since that date and 10 or 15 additional miles will be completed before winter sets in in earnest. This has been a record year for Portland in street paving and 50 additional miles are already contracted for next year.

A meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Oregon, Washington and California will be held at San Francisco in November to advance the movement for a battleship fleet for the Pacific Coast. It is expected that Rear Admiral Robley D. Evans will attend the meeting, and will assist in determining the best method of presenting the subject to Congress at its next session.
