state issues principally. He showed the importance of Oregon maintaining her place as the leader of reform legislation, as was being copied by a number of states and urged the people to stand fast for the reforms they had accomplished.

Candidate for Congress Smith closed the evening with a strong appeal to the voters to stand for their own interests. He manifested a good understanding of the duties of a congressman. The people will make no mistake if they elect him to succeed Hawley, who has misrepresented them from the first day he entered congress.

Assembly Mockery

The Oregonian, voice and soul of assemblyism, is daily devoting its energies to the disparagement of Oregon's popular laws.

Meanwhile Bowerman, created by assembly and boosted by the Oregonian, is sweating blood to show the people how he will protect and defend these same statutes.

Oh, it's a huge force—this assembly game.

Last Thursday the Oregonian devoted two columns on its tenth page to show how incapable and unprepared were the people for voting on 32 initiative laws.

But the Oregonian does not undertake to show how incapable and unworthy has been the state legislature of dealing with five or six hundred measures. That's different.

True to the instincts of assembly inspiration, the Oregonian would nourish and develop the belief of incompetency, helpless dependence and mental slavery on the part of the people.

It is the world-old business of the few with stolen privileges and presumed power to help to keep the many in quiet abeyance, while outrage after outrage is heaped upon them in the hypocritical name of superior qualification.

It is rot, an insult, wilful and conscious misrepresentation to say the average man is not qualified to pass on the laws by which he shall be governed.

It is utterly and contemptibly silly to infer that the people at large are more liable to go wrong on 32 measures than the legislature is on 500.

Many will not read and understand all these initiated laws, it is true; but will enough of such vote wrong on them to defeat the ones that should pass, or pass the ones that should be defeated?

No election so far shows such a result. On the contrary, splendid discrimination has been shown.

Does it not stand to reason that the average man will not vote at all on a measure on which he is undecided?

The calm and uninfluenced decision of such as do vote is a monumental guarantee of safety and purity as compared to standards long set by convention (or assembly) chosen legislatures.

Finally, is it not time the people be taught to enact their own laws; to give less time to creating wealth for somebody else and more to conserving it for themselves? Let them make mistakes. That's how they learn. The legislature has given them some fine lessons.

This program may be somewhat disturbing to our would-be benefactors and exploiters; it will undoubtedly be berated by the Oregonian as detrimental to our boasted commercial welfare, but it will be mighty satisfying, edifying and strengthening to the people. It will make them better able to protect themselves and thus better American citizens.—Portland Labor Press
