The Big Fact in Insurgency

If ever an organization was amply warned of the consequences of persistence in a certain policy, that organization was the Republican party prior to the last convening and during the last session of Congress. At Chicago promise had been given to the people that there would be an honest revision of the tariff downward. In the convention promise was not framed thus explicitly in the Republican platform, it was in that light that the people regarded it, and upon that assumption that they voted a continuance of Republican control. The standpatter got control, and there was not honest revision of the tariff downward.

Aside from the tariff there were other questions concerning the further development of certain liberal and progressive policies originating in the Roosevelt administration, in which the people felt that they had a vital interest. There was a strong popular demand that these policies be carried to their logical perfection, and Congress had not long been in session before it became evident to the public mind that equivocal compliance with the demand was all that could be expected.

Upon prospective failure to meet the popular wishes in these two regards, insurgency, already active, grew strenuous in its warning. It was sneered at as a visionary and impotent movement. In the halls of Congress it was held as the rant of the demagogue. The reactionary press denounced it as meaningless fustian that found no indorsement in the public judgment. There seemed to be the blind belief on the part of those long accustomed to having the Government run in their own selfish interests that what they had to say of insurgency was the truth, and that when the time came for the popular judgment to be expressed at the polls it would be once more a simple matter to convince the people that they were being misled by ambitious politicians and that as a matter of fact the moon was made of green cheese.

The voice of the people has been heard at the polls, and the standpatter and the reactionary have heard, if they have sense enough to grasp the significance of the utterance, that insurgency is the one big fact to be reckoned with.

Where Republicanism has adapted itself to this progressive idea, Republicanism was victorious, with the one notable exception of New York State, where local conditions had created a handicap that Republicanism could not overcome. There was Republican victory in Wisconsin, in Kansas, in Iowa, and in each of those states the victory was a vindication of a regenerated and progressive party. Where the big fact of insurgency was not given its due weight in Republican councils which made the issues and selected the candidates the people have administered the chastisement of defeat.

There is no getting away "from the conclusion that the great mass of American voters do not propose to be let by the nose in partisan leash because someone has said that the chief sin in all the category of sinning is departure from party regularity. Within certain obvious lines that are well defined in the public judgment, the party must be right. It must avoid palpable equivocation while doing those things which the people do not want done and leaving undone those things which the people want done. If there is wisdom in the Republican party it will heed the lesson it has been taught. If it is to remain the party of the people it must shake itself loose from the grip of those whose sole aim and ambition is to exploit the people. It must recognize this one big fact of insurgency as an imperative beckoning to higher ground, which the people are determined shall be taken in the management of the Government.—Portland Telegram
