LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS

The Scio Condensery Increases Its Capital
Stock to \$50,000

We learn from the state and county records that the Scio Condensed Milk Co., has made an important move for a permanent business. The company was first capitalized at \$15,000. It was soon found that this sum was insufficient to operate the business. It paid for the plant but did not furnish the necessary capital for operation. To get money for operating expenses, the individual members had to become responsible for the money needed.

Now knowing about what money is needed and expecting to enlarge the output, the necessary capital has been provided for. We are informed that \$35,000 of this amount has been taken and paid in.

The product of the factory, thus far, has proven to be gilt edged and the supply has been intirely inadequate to supply the demand. Orders have been on hand all the time which the company could not fill. With increased capital, so that the factory can be run to full capacity, it is expected that most of the business offered can be taken care of.

If Scio had more industries like the above, there would be no need of asking a railroad to come into town. We could hardly keep them out. Let us encourage every enterprise, no matter of what character, which will add to a payroll. We need more people, more factories and more houses for people to live in.

Monday the city council of 1910 met for its final meeting. Mayor Myer presiding. Councilmen present were J. A. Bilyeu, N. I. Morrison, Perry Bilyeu, J. L. Calavan and W. A. Ewing.

F. L. & W. committee reported that the belt at the light station had been fixed.

Scio Promises to Do More Building Than For Several Years

The present outlook for Scio and vicinity for the year 1911 seems now to be most promising. With the crop prospect being excellent and the new blood which is sure to come to our town, the business outlook is first class.

Our merchants have all reported the past year to have been most satisfactory; yet they expect the present year to surpass the year just closed in volume of business.

The building outlook, especially in the residence line, promises to be quite extensive. Among those who are expecting to erect residences are: S. Philippi, J. L. Calavan, P. H. MacDonald and J. F. Wesely. Of course there will be a number of others who have not yet fully determined to build.

The K. of P. expect to erect a Pythian temple with an opera house beneath, which will cost near \$3000.

Should our sawmill project materialize, perhaps a half-dozen or more residences, not above included, will be erected.

Should our city limits be enlarged, which now seems likely, there is sure to be something akin to a building boom inaugurated.

Our citizens should all encourage development in every way possible. We can make our town grow if we all work harmoniously for that end.

Diphtheria Was Fatal

Just after we went to press last week, we learned that the family of A. I. Arnold, of near town was afflicted with diphtheria and, because of neglect to call the doctor, in a malignant form. Several of the children had had, what was believed to be ordinary sore throat, occasioned by a cold. Home remedies were applied and all seemed to be getting over the trouble, except Walter, the subject of this item. He, not getting on as well as desired, Dr. Prill was called, who pronounced the trouble diphtheria. A trained nurse was sent for and every thing possible done. But nothing availed. Walter died last Sunday morning and was buried the following day in Franklin Butte cemetery.

Walter was a bright boy, 15 years old, exceedingly fond of his mother and well thought of by his neighbors and associates. His early and sudden taking off is extremely sad and the family have the sympathy of the entire community.

Tuesday the report came into town that Mr. Arnold had become afflicted with the same disease. But, it is thought, that he will get along all right.
