From Reports, The Scio Mutual Telephone Co. Had Quite an Interesting Meeting Saturday

After the following officers had been elected, John Holt, president; J. R. Pound, vice president; A. P. Hiron, secretary, and W. A. Ewing, treasurer, the question of buying or building a home for the central office was raised.

Parties representing Shelburn's interests offered to furnish ground and building for the central office, free of charge to the company, if the office should be moved to that town. This was considered quite a liberal offer and showed the enterprising spirit on the part of our Shelburn fellow citizens. But as a vast majority of the business for the commercial line belonging to the company originated in Scio, it was thought best to retain the central office in Scio.

A committee was appointed to ascertain cost of ground, building, etc., for a new home and the monthly assessment of 50 cents per member was ordered to provide a fund to pay for the same.

The business of the company was reported to be in a satisfactory condition.

A Valuable Cow

D. M. McKnight, R. F. D. carrier for Route 1 out of Scio, owns a cow which he thinks is about the most valuable bovine in this community. He kept a careful record of the milk obtained from her during the month of December just passed and obtained the following result:

No. of pounds of milk, weighed at every milking, 1005½

Butter test as given by Scio condensery, 6 2-10 per cent.

Value of milk product for the month at the rate paid by the condensery, \$1.75 per hundred, \$27.70.

This cow freshened in the month of November, but had no extra care more than he gives his cows all the time. A dairy herd of such cows would soon give a man a comfortable bank account.
