The Split Log Drag

Between this city and Lebanon, farmers are commencing to use the split log drag to dress up the roads after the winter wear.

All that is necessary to make these cheap and simple tools most serviceable is to first bring the road up into a rounded grade, with sufficient fall to drain the water from any portion of the roadway. Then the use of the split log drag, after the every rain of consequence will fill all ruts and holes and place the road in a condition so that a few hours of sunshine and air, will place it in an almost racetrack condition. The NEWS hopes that the use of this cheap and most serviceable road maker, will become generally used upon our dirt roads.
