C. C. Bryant was appointed examiner of titles in the applications of Luara E. Pirtle et al. and Ed Holloway et al. to register title.

Demurrer was overruled and ten days given to answer in L. A. Crandall agt. J. C. P. Mary.

In Mary McCart agt. George McCart \$190 suit money, to be paid before the 24th, was allowed the plaintiff.

In the two cases of Elva Martin agt. the city of Brownsville, for an injunction restraining the city to open streets through the property of the plaintiff, dedicated to the city for the purpose many years ago, judgement was rendered in favor of the defendant, each party to pay its own costs.

In the three cases of Linn and Lane Timber Co. against Linn county, asking for an injunction against the collection of special road taxes in district 22, 23 and 28, a demurrer to the complaint was overruled and the defendant given ten days in which to answer.

Of the 67 cases on the docket 15 are for divorce, 13 to register title, 11 for partition of property, eight for injunctions, five for foreclosure of mortgages, the others of different characters.

The 62nd congress was called to order on Tuesday at noon. The House of Representatives organized by electing Congressman Champ Clark, of Missouri speaker.
