TO PREVENT FOREST FIRES

State Forester Elliott Wants the Co-operation
of the People to Help Save
the Timber

Forest fires, one of the greatest sources of destruction to the most valuable resources of the state, will be restricted and their terrors largely reduced if the people will co-operate with the State Forester in the administration of the new forestry law enacted by the last Legislature, which will be ready for distribution in pamphlet form, in the near future.

One of the most important provisions of the law is that making a closed season for burning from June 1 to October 1, during which period outdoor fires of all kinds are prohibited except under most stringent regulations and the probability of heavy penalties.

In this connection the State Forester urges upon every one the necessity of doing all possible burning before the closed season begins and thus save the trouble and risk of doing it by permission during that season of greatest danger when fire spreads so easily and rapidly.

The State Forester desires the assistance and co-operation of every one in the protection of property from forest, grass or brush fires, and to this end invites suggestions and information calculated to assist in any manner in the performance of his most important duties. Copies of the law will be promptly furnished to all who desire them. Requests and communications addressed to F. A. Elliott, State Forester, Capitol Building, Salem, will receive prompt and appreciative attention.

PREPARE FOR YOUR COWS

If You Expect Success in the Dairy Business
Plant Forage and Root Crops
Now

The condensery will commence operations, next week, and the offerings of milk now are quite satisfactory. But, later on, when the grass has died away, or still later on when the storms of winter are on, the milk supply is likely to become too short for the profitable operation. The problem for the condensery people to solve is: How to keep up the milk supply in winter.

It is a fact, and the farmers know it, that the winter months are the most profitable for the dairyman, providing that his cows have been bred to that end and he has prepared plenty of provender for them. The price for butter fat or milk, nearly doubles up at that season of the year and the dairyman has more time to take care of his cows properly.

Feed, in the way of vetches, clovers, root crops, pumpkins and numerous vegetables, which are valuable for the dairy cow, can be grown in abundance and the cost of which is small, yet the profit in the milk pail is great. With plenty of feed of this character, not much mill feed will be required.

The fact of the business is, the successful dairyman must use his head as well as his hands. He should know the value of each one of his cows, by a milk pail test. Sell the unprofitable cow to the butcher and supply her place with one that will yield a profit. Above all, do not skimp the feed. Keep your cows in a reasonably fair condition. The milk will be more abundant and your test at the condensery or creamery will be better.

The practical dairyman can tell a profitable herd of cows as soon as he looks at them. The quality of the cow is most important, but plenty of feed is, even, of greater consequence. A good dairy herd, well kept, will soon provide you a comfortable bank account. A poor herd, ill kept, will soon place a mortgage on your farm.

Has Purchased an Auto

J. R. Pound, of the livery stable, has purchased an automobile to be used for hiring purposes. While the machine is not quite new, it has been used hardly enough to wear the new off.
