in the boundaries of the city, it may terminate our existing contracts and make us suffer loss in the renewal.

Do we need a new charter for even our own convenience? Do we need an increased limit for our tax levy? Do we need a civil engineer? Do we gain anything by spending our money for something we do not need? (It is like investing in a wooden leg before we are ready for it) Is the peace of our city in danger of being uncontrollable? Is our health in danger beyond the reach of our health ordinance, that was arranged for us a short time ago, (and now our population, to my mind, is less than when it was made?) Is the safety of the citizens in need of such hasty action? If so then our utmost efforts are in demand for prompt relief from the dangers that beset us, but as the outside does not appear to feel any distress from our difficulties, myself and several others are in favor of making them wait until they beg for our protection.

Now it seems to me that the resolution which begot this movement and sets up that the "the Charter is defective in many particulars" is nothing but a scare-crow supposition, as the present Charter has withstood all attempts to weaken it, and no doubt at this time is strong enough to sustain us whenever called upon to do so, and that the argument that extension of boundaries is necessary for progression and makes values, is nothing but wheedling sophistry calculated to display a selfishness it would be well for us to conceal.

Myself and several others consider that we are making an unnecessary expense, and using money that could be more profitably used, making enmity of an outlying district that could be avoided by the right procedure at the proper time, and causing a discord which retards the effective work of friendly co-operation in the promotion of our mutual interests and the welfare of the city, and for these reasons are in opposition to the measure.
