THE DATES ARE FIXED

Lebanon's Annual Strawberry Fair Promises
to Be a Success—Dates Are
May 31 and June 1-2

The dates for the Lebanon strawberry fair having been fixed, May 31 and June 1 and 2, the committees in charge are busy planning for the coming festival, which it is expected will eclipse the fairs that have preceded the one scheduled for the last of this month.

The program for the three days' festival, as at present arranged, is as follows:

Albany and Good Roads Day, Wednesday, May 31—Judge J. N. Duncan, Dr. Andrew Smith, Judge Webster and others will speak. Gigantic horse show and stock parade.

Grange Day, Thursday, June 1—Program by -Crowfoot Grange; grand auto parade and other attractions.

Salem Day, Friday, June 2—Speaking by Governor West, State Treasurer Kay, Judge George H. Burnett, Secretary of State Olcott, Superintendent of Public Instruction Alderman and other state officials. Grand free strawberry feast.

Issac D. Miller, a pioneer of 1850, died at his lodgings in Albany, some time during last Monday night, as he was found quite dead on the following Tuesday morning. Mr. Miller was born in 1828, and is the father of "Miller Station" midway between Albany and Jefferson. He was prominently identified in democratic politics for many years. He was an honest and upright citizen and universally respected.

TUBBS SUES FOR \$75,000

Run Down By the Albany Street Car and
Maimed For Life—Heavy
Damages Asked

Elmer W. Tubbs last week filed suit in the Linn county circuit court against the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway Co., for \$75,000 damages.

Mr. Tubbs is the cornet player who was run over in a street parade in Albany the 20th of last June, while he was marching up West First street with Arnold's Carnival Co., band.

Mr. Tubbs, who was playing with the band at the time of the accident, was marching west on West First street in the middle of the street car track of the defendant company, while the car was approaching from the opposite direction. Tubbs was thrown to the pavement and the car partly passed over him before it could be stopped.

His left leg and both arms were broken, his right shoulder dislocated and his front teeth knocked out. His leg had to be amputated above the knee. On this ground Mr. Tubbs asks for \$75,000 damages. He has retained as legal counsel Attorneys A. S. Bennett and N. J. Sinott, of The Dalles, and W. R. Bilyeu of Albany.

The case will come up at the June term of court.

GOV. WILSON AS FOE OF BOSSISM

Utterly Routed Smith in the Fight Over United
States Senatorship—Smashed
One Man Power

Hon. Woodrow Wilson, governor of New Jersey, has come very sharply into the political limelight in the last few months by reason of his fearless and effective advocacy of the rights of the people to govern themselves without interference from the great corporations and vested interests. Governor Wilson is a native of Virginia, having been born at Staunton Dec. 28, 1856. He is the son of a Presbyterian minister of Scotch Irish descent. As a boy he lived in the south and at the age of nineteen entered Princeton university, from which he was graduated in 1879. He took a course in law at the University of Virginia and was admitted to the bar. He practiced law in Atlanta for two

years and then took a postgraduate course in political economy, history and jurisprudence at Johns Hopkins university, Baltimore. His writings on political subjects while at Johns Hopkins attracted much attention, and he was offered the professorial chair at Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania, the famous college for women, where he remained for three years. From Bryn Mawr he went to Wesleyan university, at Middletown, Conn., as professor of history and political economy, and in 1890 he joined the faculty of Princeton university as professor of political economy and jurisprudence. The title of this chair was later changed to professor of jurisprudence and politics. In 1902 Professor Wilson was chosen president of Princeton university and occupied that position for eight years. His incumbency of the office was a continual fight against special privileges and an effort to make the university more democratic than it had been in the past. In 1910 President Wilson was nominated as the candidate of the Democrats of New Jersey for governor and was elected by a plurality of nearly 50,000 after a speaking campaign that was remarkable in rousing the people of the state from one end to the other and swinging to his support thousands of Republicans who were dissatisfied with the present conduct and management of the Republican party.

Governor Wilson has more than fulfilled his pledges. He promised the people of New Jersey that he would be their representative at the state capitol and would guard the interests of the whole people to the best of his ability. Among the specific promises which he made were that he would do all in his power to secure the enactment of the public utilities bill for the control of railroads and other public service corporations; a revised primary law that would give the people absolute control of the nominations for all officers, including delegates to presidential conventions, and take the selection of candidates out of the hands of the bosses; a corrupt

Standard Oil Knocked Out

According to Supreme Court decision, the Standard Oil Co. is a monopoly in restraint of trade. The court holds for the government, unanimously, and the Standard Oil combination is given six months in which to quit business.

This decision will effect, not only the Standard Oil Co., but all other trusts including the tobacco and steel trusts, all of whom will, probably, dissolve their present trust combination without an appeal to the Supreme Court. It is immensely satisfying to the people to know that our highest court is willing to stand for them on questions of this character. It does much to restore the confidence of the people in our highest court and to satisfy them that "justice" is not so blind as she was a few years ago.

practices law that would make bribery and the use of money of corporations in elections difficult, if not impossible; a law providing for the commission government of cities by the votes of the citizens and including the features of the initiative and referendum and the recall; an employers' liability law which would protect the interests of the workers automatically without making it necessary for them to go to court to obtain their rights in case of injury while at work and several reform laws of great local importance in his own state.

Although the legislature of New Jersey was Democratic on joint ballot, the senate was Republican, and at first it seemed to every one that Governor Wilson had undertaken a hopeless task of endeavoring to force these reforms through an unwilling legislature. People declared that he would find practical politics something entirely different from the academic theories which were supposed to be his political stock in trade, but they reckoned without their man. They did not realize that all of Governor Wilson's life had been a training for active participation in politics and that his studies and research into political history and political methods had given him a wider knowledge of the power of the people under aggressive leadership than any of the bosses of either party possessed. His whole political theory is based upon the right of the people to rule and their power to rule when their efforts are properly concentrated, and he demonstrated that his theory was correct when one after another his proposed reforms were forced through the legislature by the power of public opinion.

Even before Governor Wilson took his seat in the executive chamber he had won a victory over the bosses in his own party, which had inspired the people with renewed confidence and terrorized the professional politicians who were inclined to oppose his re-
