"HOMECOMING DAY" IS SET

Saturday, July 15 is Reserved For the Reunion of Former Residents of Albany

"Homecoming day" will be observed Saturday, July 15, at the second annual Chautauqua assembly in this city this Summer. It is planned to have a reunion of all former residents of Albany from all parts of the Northwest and special programmes and receptions will be arranged. "Homecoming day" was so successful last year that arrangements this year will be undertaken on a much more elaborate scale.

"Patriotic day," July 11, is set aside for members of the Grand Army of the Republic, ladies of the G. A. R. Spanish-American War Veterans and all former soldiers and sailors, who will be admitted to the Chautauqua grounds free.

The Women's Christian Temperance Union will have charge of the programme July 14. "Temperance day." It has been determined to have a "Pioneers' day," a "Women's Club day" and a "Fraternal day," but the dates have not been fixed yet. On "Fraternal day" the Modern Woodmen of America of Linn county will have a county picnic on the Chautauqua grounds.

Work on improvement of the Chautauqua grounds and the construction of the big auditorium is progressing.

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PORTLAND NEWS LETTER

Portland Turns Its Attention to the Coming Festival, When Business Will be Forgotten for a Week

Portland will be pretty much given up to its Rose Festival for the next ten days. Business affairs will be relegated to the background quite generally and the queen flower will rule with undisputed sway.

This year's spectacle promises to set a new mark, with better displays, more gorgeous pageants and better decorations of city streets and buildings than ever before. Other Oregon cities will participate to a larger extent than formerly and out-of-town people have announced their intention of coming in large numbers.

The city election will distract attention to some extent from the Festival on June 5, opening day, but with that out of the way, the remainder of the week will be given up to enjoyment. Portland rose gardens promise to produce a wealth of perfect blooms next week.

Members of the Esperanto Association of the Pacific Northwest will gather at the Portland Commercial club for a grand rally July 19-21. A big attendance is expected from Oregon and Washington particularly, while other states will be well represented. The association is now one year old. At least 25 of the leading cities of this state have regular Esperanto classes. On June 4, local Esperantists will hold a picnic at Tualatin.

A systematic campaign for German immigrants has been outlined by the Commercial club, acting with the German-speaking societies of Oregon. A conference on the subject was held recently and in future more attention will be paid to securing this immigration.

Dayton has been presented with historic Fort Sheridan by the Government and the old structure will be removed to the Dayton city park. The old blockhouse is an interesting relic of the days when the pioneers were subduing the wilderness.

Baker and Oregon City are two places that will have postal savings banks, such institutions already started in this state having proved highly successful. The Postmaster General has designated these cities as depositories and they will begin operations at once.

Oregon's importance as a fruit growing state can be better understood from the figures in the biennial report of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture, lately issued. President Newell places the total valuation of last year's fruit crop at \$6,662,500. Apples lead the list with a value of \$2,500,000 and dried prunes stands second in importance with a value of \$1,680,000.

An interurban railway from Baker through the Powder river valley to Haines and North Powder is a project dear to the heart of the Baker Commercial club and efforts will be directed on work to bring this about during the coming few months. The projected line would open up a remarkably fertile country, as well as giving access to much timber wealth.

Oregon now has or will have in a short time, four postal savings banks. Klamath Falls, Astoria, Baker City and Oregon City. It is the purpose of Postmaster General Hitchcock to make every money order postoffice a postal savings bank as quickly as the introduction of the business will permit.

John Chrz, last week, purchased from Mrs. Callie Philippi, her 65 acre farm, northwest from town, paying \$95 per acre therefor. Less than two years ago Mrs. Philippi purchased this land for \$65 per acre.
