SCIO'S FIRST RACE MEET

Three Separate Stables of Horses Will

Tomorrow afternoon, Scio's first race meet will be on. Some nine or ten horses have been in daily training for several weeks at the Fair grounds, and more have been fitted for racing at Corvallis. The entries for all the main races have been filled and a splendid afternoon of sport may be expected on each day.

No nobler contests in the way of sports can be witnessed, then that between a field of highbred horses. Seemingly the horses enter into the spirit of the sport, as well as their mounts and owners. TWO PEOPLE COMMIT SUICIDE

Mrs. Rosa Holt of Gooch and Orvil Sexton
of Crabtree, Take Own Lives

On last Tuesday word was received in this city that Mrs. Rosa Holt, of Gooch, had committed suicide by shooting herself through the head, using a revolver belonging to her husband with which to do the deed.

She had been married but a few months and, so far as known, her family relations were pleasant. She leaves a husband to mourn her loss.

On Tuesday morning, word was received that Orville Sexton, a Crabtree

merchant, had committed suicide by blowing the front of his head off with a shot gun. He went to the barn for the purpose of shooting rats. It is supposed that he was overcome with the idea of self destruction and the public now knows the rest.

So far as is known, no business nor family reasons existed to cause the rash act. He was a member of the firm of Miller & Sexton, a firm which was not involved.

He leaves a wife and two children to mourn his sudden taking off.
