GOVERNOR J. FRANK HANLY

Will Speak at the Albany Chautauqua Sunday,
July 9 at 3 p. m., on "The
Patriotism of Peace"

Concerning Hon. J. Frank Hanly, for four years governor of Indiana, who will speak at the Albany Chautauqua Assembly, Sunday afternoon, July 9, at 3 o'clock, the Los Angeles Searchlight says:

"His measurements are titanic. His proportions are in harmony with his six feet of heroic manhood. When disengaged he looks the trained athlete at rest. Upon the platform when speaking he seems a stalwart giant fit for any fray. He looks straight and steadily into the eyes of his auditors as if searching for their higher natures. He is never dramatic, but his intensity is overwhelming. His gestures are few, always unstudied and tremendously effective. His voice is strong, full and clear, with a tone of unaffected and deep human sympathy. His manner is winsome, though dominated by an imperious spirit characteristic of a great nature wholly enlisted and engaged in a great cause. He is fervent and forceful in speech with the culture and polish of an orange, the logic of a skilled advocate and enthusiasm of a reformer. His superb intellectual endowments, ripe scholarship and wide range of information, together with his indomitable will, make peculiarly potent for good all of his public attitudes, utterances and activities. That he has 'come to the kingdom for such a time as this' must be manifest to all who have, in the light of his public record, duly considered the eloquent utterances of this former chief magistrate of a great American Commonwealth."

Progress of Popular Government

Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., president of the national progressive republican league has given the following statement showing progress in the adoption of popular government:

The states in which the initiative and referendum have been adopted as a constitutional amendment are: Oregon, Oklahoma, Nevada, Missouri, Montana, South Dakota, Arkansas and Maine. Utah has adopted an initiative and referendum which is inoperative because of failure of the legislature to enact necessary legislation.

The states in which the initiative and referendum amendment has been submitted by the legislatures but has not yet been voted upon by the people are: California, Washington, Wyoming, North Dakota, Nebraska, Florida and Idaho.

The states that have adopted the Oregon plan of popular election of senators are: Oregon, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, Ohio, Kansas and California.

The states that have adopted the Oregon plan of popular vote for candidates for president and vice president are: Oregon, Nebraska, New Jersey, North Dakota and Wisconsin.

GOV. WILSON SPEAKING

The Man in Whom Many See a Future President of the United States



GOVERNMENT BY THE PEOPLE.

All Progressive Reforms Have That For Their Object, Says Wilson.

Discussing the progressive movement in politics, Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey said recently:

"If you will look at the proposed reforms, proposed by men in both parties, meant to serve the country in some special way, you will see that each particular reform has a definite object. For example, the question of the cost of living is a question which touches the great body of the people. It does not touch those exceptional persons whose income is abundant. It touches the whole body of the people. The question of direct primaries touches the accessibility of the offices by the people. It touches the means which they are to exercise to put the sort of men they desire into office. The question of the equalization of taxation means that equality which is justice, that fairness which will see that no man is taxed more than another man or upon a different basis from other men or other corporations. The question of corrupt practices in elections is a question of the attacks which have been made upon the virtue of the people.

"Every direction you turn you will see that what we are striving after is to bring the government back within the touch of the people and to use it in behalf of the people. Upon what sort of occasion, therefore, in what sort of campaign, should a man who remembers the long traditions of American government take greater pleasure and rest than in a campaign which has such objects?"

THE PROGRESSIVE MOVEMENT.

It Is Pervading the Whole Country, Declares Woodrow Wilson.

How widespread is the progressive movement in American politics was eloquently expressed by Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey in a recent speech. The governor said:

"It does not require any great imagination to think that high thoughts and purposes in politics are running subtly through every household and every member of every household in this country. It does not need that you should touch elbows—actually touch elbows—with men in the street and men in the shop in order to know the great issues of human happiness that are involved in a great contest like this, for the question of the tariff is not a mere question of policy. It is a question of the rearrangement of the public interests as you touch every household in this country, and how any man in such circumstances can hold his head up after he has voted for a special interest without a just conception of the common interests for one cannot comprehend.

"But whether men can comprehend it or not, help it or not, we all know that the 'mills of the gods grind slowly,' and they 'grind exceedingly fine,' and the men who now resist this great impulse of reform, the men who impede this great compulsion of public interest, will be ground so fine in some of these mills of the gods that their very dust will be imperceptible."

Labor Press Thoughts

The workers use ballots as their intelligence increases.

It cannot be repeated too often: The tariff is a monstrous fraud.

Within the past year the British Land Values Taxation League has distributed fifty million leaflets on the subject, and sold or given out over 150,000 pamphlets.

Timber land is held at big figures by the Southern Pacific. This property is held undeveloped, but the Oregonian never kicks about that kind of grab and conservation.

The coal and steel trust are one. Land known to be worth \$60,000 an acre is assessed as wild land for five dollars an acre, and less, owned by this combine. Then farmers wonder why taxes are so high.

The water power of Oregon should be taxed. It should support the state government and the schools. The water power of the Willamette Falls at Oregon City is worth not less than \$180,000 a year. It pays nothing.

New Westminster is the latest town to take taxes off improvements. It is another British Columbia city that stands in line for common sense in taxation. Oregon will be good and ready to line up by the time it gets a chance.

The Canadian states of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba have swept out the Bell telephone trust, and the rates for this public service are constantly being reduced. Why should not Oregon establish a state-owned and operated telephone system?

The Compton-Easton Trial

The central feature of the Circuit Court proceedings in Albany, last week was the Compton-Easton damage suit. Of course the suit was of interest to the people of the "Forks", because both plaintiff and defendant are well known in this section of the country. It developed in the trial, that there are factions in District No. 4, and a disposition to "get even" with each other. The statement of facts on the one side were exactly contrary to those stated on the other side showing, conclusively that there was a straining of the truth somewhere.

It is extremely unfortunate when neighborhoods become divided in this feud-like manner. It is sure to generate a wider difference of feeling in the rising and future generations. We suggest to our friends in District No. 4, and we assume that all are our friends, that any further discussion of the present difference be completely dropped and that, in the future, if you cannot say good of a neighbor, say nothing. Let the decision of the jury in the late trial be right or wrong, for the sake of public peace and prosperity of the neighborhood, drop the whole matter now and, in the future, have a charitable feeling towards each other. There is a plenty of trouble in this life, do the best we can, without stirring up neighborhood brawls.

PORTLAND NEWS LETTER

Portland, Or.—Great benefit is expected to result to Interior Oregon from the selection during the past week of an experiment station site in Harney county near Burns. The location was picked by experts from the Oregon Agricultural College and a tract of 160 acres was selected. A capable man from the college will be placed in charge and soil problems of the interior will be solved. Proper dry farming methods will be shown and the station will serve as a nucleus for a number of other experimental farms throughout Harney county. Later it is hoped others will be established in Eastern Oregon.

A new industry has been started near Gresham, where a Japanese woman has a thriving colony of silk worms that she has raised from imported cocoons this spring. The worms are now spinning their silk and will soon develop to the butterfly stage.

September 1 is the date set for opening the railroad from Portland to Tillamook and people in that corner of the state will have a big celebration when the first train reaches Tillamook Bay from Portland.

The Pacific Highway Convention will be held in Portland August 4 and 5 and arrangements will be made by the Portland Automobile Club and representatives from every prominent city on the Coast are expected to attend. A number of automobilists will come down in their cars from Seattle. Some good work may be expected for good roads as the result of this convention and particularly for the great highway projected along the coast line from Canada to Mexico.
