### Good Republican Doctrine

"I am convinced," says the President, "that in respect to reciprocity with Canada it can be reconciled to the most orthodox Republican tariff views, and I am equally convinced that no Democrat ought to oppose it."

No Democrat does oppose it openly, though the Democrats join in a strategic effort to embarrass and demoralize the parliamentary campaign for reciprocity by advancing the free list and vital tariff measures on the Senate calendar, for consideration prior to the final vote on reciprocity. But the Democrats will wind up by supporting the reciprocity treaty almost to a man, for there is no escape for them.

But does the President express a real conviction when he says he will undertake to reconcile reciprocity with the most orthodox Republican view? Or does he merely offer the suggestion as a palliative to those rookribbed Republicans who see, in reciprocity the first great departure of a Republican President from the protective principle? Reciprocity is an orthodox Republican policy to be sure, and so is protection. But we cannot have reciprocity and protection at the same time with the same nations. That is obvious. It is clear to Republicans, Democrats, everybody, to the extent that we have reciprocity with Canada, we have free trade with Canada; the same with any other country.

The Democrats, therefore, favor reciprocity with Canada because it is free trade with Canada, and they are for free trade. The Republicans—some of them—are for reciprocity because protection for our infant industries is becoming an outworn creed, and the temper and spirit of the times insists on revision, division and equality of tariff favors and advantages; and the era of the consumer who wants to buy where he can buy best and cheapest, is at hand.

The Democrats are for reciprocity because they have always been for it; some Republicans are for it because the country demands it.—The Oregonian
