A POSSIBILITY

Why do not some of our farmers organize for the purpose of marketing their surplus fruit and vegetables and other products of their farms? Hundreds of dollars worth of fruits go to waste in this vicinity each year which could be marketed without a great deal of trouble if some united effort were put forth to secure a regular outlet for it.

We believe this is a matter worthy of serious consideration by every one who has a surplus of produce of any kind. Scio is only 70 miles from the best market on the Pacific coast. Our train service is such that produce may be placed on the city market by noon or earlier each day. The demand for such supplies is enormous and will increase greatly year by year. City population on the coast is increasing at a startling rate. The problem of an adequate food supply is becoming a serious one. The time is not far distant when practically all the land within a radius of 100 miles of Portland will have to be given over to fruit growing or truck gardening.

So far the people in this vicinity have given most, and in many cases, all their attention to the production of grain, hay and the raising of live stock. In the no distant future this will be changed from necessity.

But even now nearly every farmer has more fruit and garden produce than he can possibly use. Now if some plan could be devised whereby such products could easily be marketed it would be just so much clear gain to the producer.

The News offers the following as a possible plan of getting the matter under way:

Have the matter discussed at the next meeting of the Grange or at some other suitable gathering and, if the proposition seems to be of enough interest, let a committee be appointed to arrange with some responsible commission house to take all produce supplied from this station. The next step would be to arrange for a receiving station for the produce brought in. This would enable the farmer to simply load on to his wagon any produce on hand when ready for a trip to town and on arrival he could simply turn it over to the man in charge here who would take charge of same and ship it to the commission house and, when the latter paid for the produce, remit to the farmer. In other words, the farmer need be

to no further trouble than he would be if he sold his produce to the home merchant. At present, the home merchants can not find a market for nearly all the produce offered them.

Farmers elsewhere have made a success of an organization of this kind. Why can it not be done here?

P. S.—Since writing the above lines there has come to hand a direct inquiry from a Portland wholesale house which is of interest in this connection. In another column we shall publish a part of the letter.
