OUR AGED PIONEERS

Sketches of the Lives of Men and Women
Who Have Survived Many
Hardships

The News wishes to publish the story of one of the old pioneers and residents of Scio and vicinity each week. 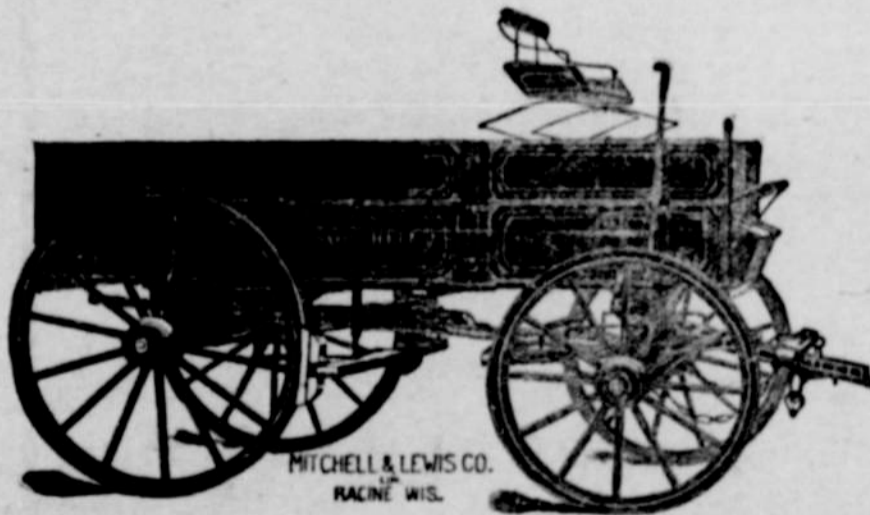
Walter Clute Miller

Perhaps there are none of our pioneers who have had so varied an experience or who have made more business changes than has the subject of this sketch. As a trader he has had few equals. Mr. Miller was born in Onadago, Co., N. Y. on May 14, 1834 and ten years later moved to DeKlab, Co., Ill. On April 5, 1853 at the age of 19 he and his brother, Cotton S. H. Miller, joined Ward's train and crossed the plains. The trip was made safely and no trouble was had with the Indians which so often were a menace to the early pioneers. The trip took from April to Sept., in which month he arrived in Oregon City. A sister who made part of the journey turned aside to go to California. Staying but a short time in Oregon City, Mr. Miller next went to North Yamhill where he was soon taken down with typhoid fever. Upon his recovery he went to Peterson's Butte, near Lebanon and then on to the mines in December of the same year. The following spring he went to Jackson Co., in southern Oregon where he staid until 1857, the greater part of the time being in and near Phenox. While there he joined the Oregon Volunteers and spent about 16 months in fighting against the Indians in their last stand against the whites.

In 1857 after the close of the war he came to Scio and established a harness shop where Peery's Drug Store now stands. Here he made the first set of harness and the first saddle ever made in Scio. About a year later he sold out to E. S. Gilkerson and then married Miss Harriet Hamilton in July 1858. Soon after he bought a farm of 100 acres on Crabtree creek which he kept for about six months and then traded for a saw-mill on Thomas creek. At the end of a year and a half he sold out to Carl Bros., and bought a part of the old Howell homestead. A few months later he again sold out, went to California for 6 months returned as far as Rogue River Valley where he staid until the following summer, and then returned to Scio and bought the harness shop again, which he kept about 6 months and then resold to the former owner. In the meantime having bought 80 acres of land on the north side of Franklin Butte, he decided to move onto his farm. But in a short time he traded for a place on the south side of the same butte and kept buying more land until he had more than a section.

Next he formed a partnership with Hank Miller and bought a saw-mill on Thomas creek the purchase price being \$10,000. This Mr. Miller kept longer than any other investment something over 18 years, largely because he could not sell, he claims, but finally sold out for \$3000.00. He next moved to the old homestead where he has since lived most of the time until about a year ago. From there he moved to Scio for a few months and then moved to his present home in West Scio where he is living at the time this sketch is being written. But he is always ready for a trade and may have changed again by the time this is published this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller are the parents of 13 children, 11 of whom are living. M. W. Miller and Lydia Ann are dead. (Continued on page 4)
