SUNDAY POOL

At the next council meeting the question of permitting or refusing to allow Sunday pool playing will very likely be decided. People will differ as to the wisdom of changing the present regulations.

If the business should continue under the present management there would not be much objection as it seems to be the consensus of opinion that the game has been kept exceptionally clean. There have been none of the usual bad associations which so often are found in connection with pool rooms. There has been no gambling, no blind pig booze, or no loud and coarse language allowed. In short our best citizens have felt free to patronize the place as the management has been clean.

It is always easier to let down the bars than to put them up again. This seems to us to be the feature deserving most careful consideration of our city fathers. Of course there is the general objection some have of permitting any business to be carried on on Sunday. But as long as Sunday base ball and Sunday shows are permitted we fail to see how pool playing, if clean, can be any worse.

The Matter and the Rabbit.

Millions of rabbits are killed annually in the British islands and in Australia for their skins, or rather for their fur, which is used in making felt hats. Great quantities of the English rabbit skins are sent to hat manufacturers in the United States, but first they go to the continent of Europe to have the long, useless hairs laboriously pulled out by cheap hand labor. Satisfactory machines to do this work are said to be lacking. After the skins reach America the close hair or fur is shaved off to be made into felt.
