Country Club Milk

forced to begin operations just as early in the spring as the supply of milk will justify. There is no reason at all why this plant should be idle at all if the farmers would just make arrangements to furnish milk in paying quantities.

The trouble in the past has been that the farmers have not been united enough and as a result nearly every community has had two, three or four wagons making trips there to collect milk for as many different firms when one wagon could have handled all the milk at much less cost and hence a better price could have been paid the producer for the milk. Teams cannot be sent thru the country for pleasure and the farmer has to pay the cost of any extra charges due to several partially loaded wagons.

Whether or not the Seio plant continues running or not now rests entirely with the farmers. The company after many costly experiments has learned the secret of making one of the best milks on the entire coast. Its up to the farmers now to furnish the milk and keep a large amount of money in circulation here which otherwise will go elsewhere.

Holly Condensed milk, butter fat 7.51 per cent, total solids 22.27 per cent. Illegal.

Borden's Pioneer Milk, butter fat 7.6 per cent, total solids 25.72. Legal in state only.

Yeloban Condensed milk, butter fat 7.6 per cent, total solids 27.95 per cent. Legal in state only.

Mt. Vernon Evaporated milk, butter fat 6.1 per cent, total solids 23.41 per cent. Illegal.

Hoffman House Brand, butter fat 6.6 per cent, total solids 24.59 per cent. Illegal.
