PORTLAND NEWS LETTER

Closer Relations With the Outside Country Will Be Fostered By Portland Business Men

A step of permanent constructive benefit was taken last Saturday night at the Portland Commercial Club, when business men gathered at a dinner to discuss the benefits of recent excursions to Klamath Falls, Central Oregon and Aberdeen, Wash. The big dining room was filled by men of affairs and the experiences given and the policy outlined for future excursions were of great value.

The meeting developed into a symposium on the attitude of Portland business men to outside territory in the two states and was a survey of conditions existing from Aberdeen to Klamath and in Central Oregon. The result will be a closer tie between Portland and the outlying country and this promises to be of great aid in future development.

OUR AGED PIONEERS

Sketches of the Lives of Men and Women
Who Have Survived Many Hardships

N. YOUNG

N. Young was born in Uniontown, Fayette county, Pennsylvania, July 12, 1829. He moved with his parents to Ohio in 1837.

Mr. Young was married April 16, 1857 to Miss May A. Miller. Nine children were born to them, six of whom are still living. A. M. Young, of Tygh Valley, Ore.; Melancthon of Portland; William H. of Scio; Mrs. A. J. Johnson of Corvallis; Mrs. C. A. Warner of Scio and C. N. Young of Corvallis.

Mr. Young and family moved from Ohio to Minneapolis, Minn., in 1862, residing there twelve years engaged in the milling business. He came from there to Oregon to start the mill at Stayton in 1875. They made the trip by rail to San Francisco, thence to Portland by steamer.

In 1881 he erected the Scio Flouring Mill and has lived here continuously for the past 30 years. During this time he

has lived in the same house and has changed his quarter block from a bare plot to one of the prettiest premises in the city.

In his yard are a number of fine cherry trees which he set out and has seen grow to be fine large trees.

Mr. Young is as active as most men 30 years younger. He celebrated his 82nd birthday July 12. He cultivated and picked a large crop of strawberries last spring and also has been able to climb and pick cherries from his old favorites.

Next to his love for home is his interest in his lodge, he has been an active Mason for 58 years and seldom misses a meeting.

Mr. Young has not been sick since 1863 when he contracted typhoid fever, his only illness. He has always been temperate in his habits and taken good care of his health.

His wife died February 2, 1904 and he has lived alone keeping his home just the same.

SCHOOL ENGLISH

The work will be taken from the written work of the different grades and should be of some interest to the parents as well as an incentive to the pupil to do their best work.

The Resources of Linn County

Linn county is one of the most beautiful counties of Oregon. It extends from the Willamette river on the west to the summit of the Cascade mountains on the east and contains 2,311 square miles. It is bounded on the north by the North Santiam river and is traversed by the South Santiam, Calapoia, Thomas creek and Crabtree creek which with their various branches, afford great water power for industries and supply the land with enough water to prevent drouth during the dry season.

In the valleys are many up-to-date farms on which are grown various products. The small farms raise vegetables and small fruits for which there is always great demand because Linn county is in commercial touch with Portland and other cities. The larger farms contain from 100 to 300 acres and sometimes even more than that. On these farms much hay and grain is grown. Nearly every ranch has its orchard and a first class herd of cattle.

Oftimes there are orchards which, generally speaking, comprise the whole of one man's wealth. There are apple, prune, cherry and peach orchards and as these have proven a success more are being set out each year.

Dairying is also carried on extensively and, almost without exception, the man who devotes his time to the tending of cattle makes it pay with an account in the bank.

Of the different manufacturing industries Linn county is well represented, having a woolen mill at Brownsville, paper mill at Lebanon, two foundries, a sash, door and chair factory, five flouring mills, and four creameries.

The natural resources of Linn county are somewhat limited. Lumbering is the greatest and a number of towns are noted for this industry alone. The timber is mostly a species of fir although there is much oak and maple besides various other kinds of wood not so important. Fir is used for building purposes and cord wood. Oak is used extensively for fence posts and finishing lumber.

The water supply, which has already been mentioned, is a great resource to the people of this country. By means of it machinery is run and suitable crops are grown. Mineral springs have been founded and are visited each year by many people. The climate is equable with not a great deal of heat in summer or much snow in winter.
