WHY NOT SCIO, TOO

Nearly every city, village and hamlet in Oregon except Scio has some kind of an organization for boosting its particular advantages and letting intending immigrants know of the opportunities awaiting the newcomer. Scio, also, should have some such organization. We do not mean one of the booster class which tries to make the unwary think that Paradise has at last been located; such clubs do more harm than good. Oregon has suffered much from such ill advised advertising. Many a person has returned east thoroughly disgusted with Oregon and Oregon people because of false claims made in literature sent out broad cast and which claimed every advantage under the sun with no mention made of any of the disadvantages. One person, who is thus led to expect wonders and who returns disappointed and disgusted, can do more harm to our state than hundreds of circulars can overcome.

What we want people back east to know is the plain unvarnished truth. We, who know conditions here are satisfied and more than satisfied with them, and if easterners who are told the truth are not satisfied to come to Oregon they are welcome to stay away.

The writer has seen a large part of Oregon and also is somewhat familiar with the literature sent east by many commercial clubs, as he himself was well supplied before coming west. We know of no part of the state which has a brighter prospect for good, substantial, permanent growth than has Linn county and this part of Linn county stands second to none in future possibilities. To us one of the best advantages we now have is the fact that this part of the state has not been overadvertised. Hence, growth here, has been healthy. No mushroom growth, no "busted" booms, have hurt this section.

But there is a possibility of being too modest. We have possibly been taking the other extreme. We have been rather selfish with our blessings. The day of large holdings of agricultural land is rapidly passing. In

the near future farming must be more intensive, less extensive on the part of each farmer. A few acres well cultivated rather than many acres of low production must become the rule. The day of cheap land is already past. Land is rapidly becoming too valuable to be allowed to remain idle.

The vicinity of Scio offers many opportunities to new settlers. There is yet plenty of room and some of the best bargains in land to be found anywhere in Linn county are to be found not many miles away. There are hundreds of acres of as fine fruit lands near Scio as can be found in Hood River or Southern Oregon. Golden opportunities are awaiting some one.

Why not have a local organization which will take hold and let the investors who are constantly coming to Oregon know of the opportunities offered in this section? No need to do any wild-cat advertising. The plain truth will suffice. We would be pleased to have others express their views.
