Oregon-California Railroad Grant Case, the Oregon Congressional delegation be petitioned to use every known resource towards securing the lands involved for public school purposes.

That we favor medical inspection and investigation of sanitary conditions in both city and rural schools.

That we heartily approve of the law for supervision of rural schools and favor its extension as rapidly as conditions will warrant.

That we favor industrial work in our schools, but only when properly subordinated to and correlated with the regular courses.

That we favor so changing our present school law that the State Board of Education shall consist of seven members, a majority of whom shall be actually engaged in educational work.

That the State Board of Education shall constitute the State Text Book Commission.

That a law be passed forbidding any company to collect a higher price for books in Oregon than the same books are offered to other states, allowance being made for transportation.

That a system of distribution be adopted by which a sufficient number of books will be supplied to each district fully to meet the needs of the schools therein located.

That we heartily and unqualifiedly endorse the present efficient and progressive administration of Superintendent Alderman and that we pledge him our unwavering support.

To restore privilege of exemption of 90 per cent under the old law.

That we urge that a state law be enacted whereby the teachers who lost their exemptions of 90 per cent may have those rights restored to them.
