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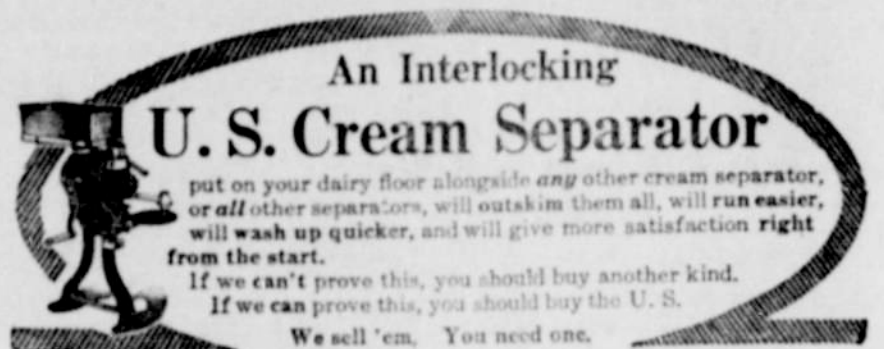
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FRUIT GROWERS

This is what D W Rumbaugh, Linn County Fruit Inspector says about spraying. "All orchards, no matter what kind of fruit, should be sprayed in the fall or just before the buds open in the spring with Lime-Sulphur spray. Lime-sulphur, while not a cure-all, has both insecticide and fungicide properties. Bordeaux spray or Arsenate of lead are to be used for different purposes; the one is a fungicide, the other an insecticide

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
