PORTLAND NEWS LETTER

**Portland Fat Stock Show a Great Success
—Would Change Opening of Season
for Big Game to Sept. 1**

Portland, Or., March 26 (Special).—In quality of stock exhibited, in the number of thoroughbred animals entered, the prizes realized by stockmen for their fancy exhibits, the attendance and the absorbing interest manifested in the show, not only by breeders of the entire Northwest, but by the general public, the Fat Stock Show held by the Pacific Northwest Livestock Association at Portland last week was the most successful event of the kind ever held on the Pacific coast. Weather conditions were ideal and the attendance was estimated to exceed 6,000 people during the three days.

The quality of the stock was no far superior to that of last year that officials and stockmen were positive that the grand champions of former years would not have been eligible for even the smallest prizes this year. The champion carload, consisting of 15 head of magnificent Herefords was probably never surpassed, if equalled, at any show in the United States. This carload was sold at auction, bringing \$10.10 per 100 lbs., almost \$1 per 100 more than paid for the champion carload last year.

The grand champion steer, also a Hereford entered by the University of Idaho, was a beautiful two-year-old of almost faultless proportions, and was sold for \$1.20 per lb. on foot, a price which has been exceeded but once in the United States for a single meat animal. The second prize steer was sold for 50c per pound.

A prominent feature of the show was the splendid exhibit of hogs from Central and Eastern Oregon. alfalfa-fed and wheat-finished in every instance, equalling in size and quality any similar showing made in recent years in the best hog and corn growing states of Middle West. Prices for hogs averaged nearly 8c per pound.

The "Getting Acquainted" tour of the Idaho-Washington Development League and the special excursion to the Pacific Northwest Livestock Show at Portland proved to be the biggest event of its kind in the history of the Pacific Northwest. Representative citizens to the number of 238, with their families, visited Pasco, Vancouver, Portland, The Dalles, Hood River, Pendleton and Walla Walla. At each of the points outside of Portland they were shown special courtesies by representatives of the commercial clubs. At Walla Walla the pilgrims assisted in the closing program connected with the organization of the South Central Washington Development League. At Portland they were the guests of the Commercial Club and the business men of Portland on the 18th, and on the next day were entertained by the livestock association at the fat stock show.

Governor West has offered to co-operate, using all the resources at his command, with a joint committee of the Portland Commercial Club, Chamber of Commerce and Realty Board in making general investigations into the operations of any person, firm or corporation in Oregon presenting to the public an investment of doubtful or suspicious character. The investigations are to be followed by relentless prosecution.

At the annual meeting of the Oregon Conservation Association held in Portland on March 18, the delegates favored a change in the date of the opening of the season for hunting big game from August 1 to September 1. It also endorsed the United States Senate bill

LET PEOPLE RULE, SAYS ROOSEVELT

OPPOSES PRESIDENT'S ATTITUDE
ON POPULAR GOVERNMENT.

People's Voice Must Prevail

Cheered for Speech in Opening Active Campaign for Nomination—Quotes Taft as Opposed to the Majority. Stands Squarely on His Columbus, Ohio, Address.

The salient passages in Colonel Roosevelt's forceful campaign speech, delivered in Carnegie Hall, New York, Wednesday evening, is given below:

The great fundamental issue now before the republican party and before our people can be stated briefly. It is, are the American people fit to govern themselves, to rule themselves, to control themselves?

I believe they are. My opponents do not. I believe in the right of the people to rule. I believe that the majority of the plain people in the United States will, do, day in and day out, make fewer mistakes in governing themselves than any similar class (Concluded on page 8)

OREGON WILL SEND EXHIBIT

State will be Furnished Free Booth at
Northwestern Product Exposition at
Minneapolis Nov. 12-23

Oregon will show from 150,000 to 200,000 people a big display of her products at the Northwestern Products Exposition to be held at Minneapolis November 12 to 23.

Governor West has received word from the officers of the Northwest Development League that the Civic and Commerce Association of Minneapolis has agreed to a deal whereby this state will be furnished exhibit space for its official display without cost at the Products Exposition. The business interests of Minneapolis are also erecting a great exposition building as a home for this exhibition of Northwest products.

The governor will probably appoint a commission to assist state officers in the work of collecting and installing an exhibit. Under this plan no county nor community will have an advantage over others in the state. Any city, county or reputable land company desiring to make an independent exhibit will be able to secure a limited amount of space adjoining the state exhibit on reasonable terms.
