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WHY THE DEMOCRATS SHOULD NAME WILSON

R. F. Beasley, Prominent Editor, Gives Strong Reasons.

By R. F. BEASLEY, Editor of the Monroe (N. C.) Journal. A dozen years ago Judge Walter H. Neil sent me a book by Woodrow Wilson, which was my first acquaintance with this student and statesman. The clearness of statement and the vigor of the ideas of that book marked, to my mind, the work of a man who was some day to be a great force in this country. Since then I have been a Wilson man, only waiting the time when the circumstances and the demands of democracy should press into service the master character that was then in the course of preparation. Emerson said that the world would sooner or later make a beaten track to the door of the man who knew and did well his job, no matter what that work might be nor what the situation of the door.

Cradled in the pure ideals of southern Anglo-Saxon democracy, Woodrow Wilson has all his life been a profound student of the science of government and the principles of real democracy, and it is not singular that a man of this type, having had the rare opportunity of developing his administrative and practical abilities in the management of a great university, where he was called upon to fight a tremendous battle in behalf of practical democracy against entrenched privilege as insistent for advantage as it is in the government of the United States, should be revealed to the world as the master mind in the interpretation and application of the democracy that is today struggling to throw off the shackles that privilege and shortsightedness have fastened upon this great democratic land. He is the master of his job, masterful in ideas and ignorant of the mere phrases and blatherings of politicians, explains why the heart of democracy, burdened today as never before with the longing for light and leadership, has turned universally to this man of the hour.

In the light of the breadth, the depth, the understanding and the sympathy of a man like Woodrow Wilson the effort to tag any man "southern," "western" or "northern" seems puerile. The problems of democracy are not sectional. Indeed, only in a narrow sense—national—they are worldwide. The man whose vision is too limited to see this is no democrat at all, only a partisan, and because Woodrow Wilson is such a man the darts and slings of petty warfare have fallen harmlessly from his armor and the sun of his democracy day by day penetrates deeper and deeper the recesses of the country. These are the fundamental reasons why I am for Woodrow Wilson.

The next reason is that he is the only man who can win. No man with a local tag can ride the gale in the coming crisis. The current of rising democracy is too strong and deep to be diverted into slush gates and stagnant pools. The people will not be diverted. If they can't get the genuine article that Wilson stands for they will grasp at the shadow in the form of Theodore Roosevelt. With the Democratic banner in the hands of a real champion it will make little difference whether the Republicans nominate the progressive counterfeit Roosevelt or the genuine standpat Taft.

The battle today is for equality against privilege, not for party against party, section against section or partisan against partisan, and the people will follow only that leader whose face is set toward the citadel and not on the retiring skirmish line. The man and the occasion have met. The opportunity of the Democratic party consists in its ability to recognize the fact.

MADE-IN-LINN EXPOSITION

Meeting to be Held at Albany April 16, 19 and 20 Will Stimulate Interest in "Made-in-Oregon" Goods

Col. E. Hofer, representing the Portland Manufacturers Association in their "Made in Oregon" campaign for home industries, was in Albany last week consulting with Manager Stewart in relation to the program for the "Made in Linn county" exposition, which is to be held at Albany, April 18, 19 and 20. Meetings are being held all over the state by the manufacturers for the purpose of enlisting the people in a general movement to give preference in buying to goods and articles made in Oregon. In connection with the meeting in this county the Albany Commercial Club decided to hold an exposition where all goods and articles made in Linn county can be shown. Their plan has been warmly endorsed by the people and it is now assured that the large hall at the Armory building will be completely filled by exhibits of made in Linn county goods. Col. Hofer says Linn is the first county to arrange for these meetings in such a comprehensive way, but others are beginning to ask for information about it, and will undoubtedly follow our lead.

The program arranged will in a general way be about as follows:

Thursday, April 18 at 1:30 p.m.—Opening of Exposition.

Evening, 8 o'clock—Addresses by two speakers from the Manufacturers Association of Portland on the subjects, "Existing Oregon Industries," and "New Industries for Linn County."

Friday, April 19, 1:30 p.m.—Convention of Fruit Growers and Vegetable Gardeners, to be addressed by at least two of the best informed men on the Northwest Coast on the successful marketing of our horticultural products.

Evening at 8 o'clock—Addresses by prominent educators on the subject, "Education and our Industries."

Saturday evening, 8 o'clock—Ladies night. Addresses devoted to Oregon Industries and the Home.

At one of the evening meetings L. D. Mahone, Secretary of the State Miners Association, will deliver an illustrated lecture upon the development of the geological products of Oregon.

SPRAY NOW

Get ready to spray for codlin moth and use the following: Take two lbs. of arsenate of lead, place in one-half gallon of water and stir until thoroughly dissolved, then add to this 48 gallons of water, then add, after stirring, 1½ gallons of lime and sulphur solution for scab. Use this mixture when at least 90 or 95 per cent of the petals have fallen, and do thorough work, covering all of the blooms. If this is well done and all the fruit thoroughly sprayed again in about two weeks with the same formula, this will control the codlin moth, also the apple scab. D. W.
