OBITUARY

Lee Shelton was born in Jackson Co, Missouri in 1835 and died at his home at West Scio, July 23, 1912, at the age of 76 years, 10 mos and 5 days. He crossed the plains with his parents by ox team in 1847 where they settled on a donation land claim about 7 miles east of Scio. After marrying he settled on his farm adjoining his fathers, residing there continuously until about ten years ago, when he moved to Scio, and in 1911 moved to West Scio. He was married in 1863 to Mary A Forgey, ten children being born to this union, three girls and seven boys. One girl and one boy died a number of years ago. Those of his immediate family surviving him are, his widow Mary A, Frank and Art Shelton, Elva Phillips, of West Scio, Albert Shelton of Arlington, John, Roe and Clifford Shelton and Laura Knauf of Scio. Uncle Lee was an honest, truthful citizen who assisted in building up this part of Oregon, so one more of our pioneer citizens, kind husband, and accommodating neighbor has passed from his labors in this life to his reward. Interment was made in the Miller cemetery near Shelburn and the funeral services conducted by G L Sutherland.

Mary Elizabeth Gibbins was born in Kentucky June 15, 1825 and died at the home of her daughter Mrs Vina Randall in Scio, July 31, 1912, at the age of 84 years, 1 mo and 16 days. When 11 years old she moved with her parents to Andrew county, Missouri, where in 1844 she was married to Samuel T Miller. In 1852 they crossed the plains by ox team, settling on a donation land claim 9 miles southeast of Scio, living there until 1876, since when she had made her home in Scio. Her husband died in 1889. To them were born six girls and four boys, one daughter and one son having passed away some years ago, the surviving children being W D Miller of Independence, E S Miller of Idaho, G C Miller of Wash, Sarah A Gamber of Flanagan, Amanda J Hudson of Wash, Rebecca C Miller of Halsey, Clara F Buckner of Independence and Vina Randall of Scio. In youth Mrs Miller united with the Cumberland Presbyterian church and lived a devoted Christian life. She was a kind faithful wife, mother and neighbor, was always quiet in the home attending to her duties and giving her children good living advice. Another pioneer home builder and Christian mother has gone to her peaceful rest. Funeral services at the Scio Baptist church, August 2, conducted by A J McLean, and interment was made in the Franklin Butte Masonic cemetery by the side of her husband.
