PAGET AND SMILLMAN COMING

That the prohibitionists of Oregon are in this campaign to win is evident. Their candidates for congress are now making a tour throughout the state in what they call the "Automobile Water Wagon." They are speaking in from ten to nine towns per day. They will speak in Scio tomorrow, Friday, at 1:15 p. m., on the political issues of the day.

Here is what the Hillsboro Argus has to say about the water wagon trip:

"The political phase was very much in evidence in the addresses delivered by R Lee Paget, prohibition candidate for United States senator and O S Smillman, candidate for congress, at Hillsboro Monday eve. The party was making a tour of the county in what they termed the automobile water wagon, beginning at Sherwood in the morning and concluding with a speech at Orenco in the evening.

Mr Paget was very frank in his statement that he wanted the job of U S senator because he wanted it, and also that he believed himself better fitted for the place than either of the other candidates. He did not touch upon woman suffrage, which he is said to favor.

Mr Smillman is a fluent speaker and made an effective address. He illustrated his points with many anecdotes and held the attention of the audience closely."

A Tooth.

A tooth is a living structure. Inside of each tooth is a cavity filled with pulp, which gives it life. Nerves and blood vessels connect this pulp with the general system and the circulation of the body. The ivory surrounding the pulp is covered over by a surface of enamel. Both ivory and enamel are harder than any other bones, because they contain a greater quantity of bone earth. Enamel on the tops of the teeth is one-sixteenth of an inch thick. It consists of little six sided prisms placed side by side and held together by an exquisitely fine cement. The pulp of the tooth becomes diseased and toothache follows. Tartar is a secretion made by three glands in the mouth, full of small, living organisms, which assimilate matter in the saliva and deposit on the teeth in the shape of phosphate of lime.

The Muff.

In many of the portraits of the sixteenth century one often sees a strip of rich, soft fur wound around the wrist of a noble dame. This was used to cover the neck or fulfill the function of a muff, and to it was often attached a small animal's head or a skull cunningly wrought in metal and adorned with precious stones. The first Venetian muffs were small, made of a single piece of velvet, brocade or silk lined with fur, the opening enriched with gold or silver buttons set with stones. By 1662 the muff seems to have been recognized as the necessary adjunct of the wardrobe of a woman of fashion.
