### School Notes

At the beginning of the third week of school the enrollment was as follows: Primary 22, Intermediate 45, Grammar 23, High school 27, total 122.

Some inconvenience has been occasioned by lack of text books in the high school and in some of the grades, but all are now

supplied and work is going on smoothly.

We find most of the students exceptionally earnest in their work. Ten or more in the high school are taking all or part of the normal work. While it somewhat crowds our course to carry four normal subjects, the effort required will be amply repaid if this number of students can thus be aided in their future work as teachers.

While we shall welcome new students to the high school at any time during the year, we would urge those who intend to enter at all to do so at once. Late enrollment is a serious hindrance to effective school work. It makes the work inconvenient for the teacher and difficult for the pupil. And more than this, it may discourage the child, make a poor student of a naturally good one, change his attitude towards school and towards education and so materially affect his future life.

The state Free Traveling Library has been requested again for this year. If we are successful in getting a box of books, they will be handled by the high school in connection with the school library and offered to the public for reading.
