C., by Walter Worrell, the local secretary of the civil service commission. This was the first examination to take place under the new system adopted by congress at the last session. It provides that rural carriers shall take such an examination that they may become city carriers or railway mail clerks without taking another examination and that they shall be eligible for such positions. Those who took examinations here Saturday were all residents of this county and are applying for positions in this county.
