The city levies for the extension of the 1912 assessment roll of Linn county as reported to County Clerk Marks are as follows: Albany, 13 mills; Lebanon, 10 mills; Brownsville, 8 mills; Scio, 8 mills; Harrisburg, 7 mills; Halsey, 5 mills, and Sodaville, 4 mills. All of the cities and towns in the county have not reported on the city levies.—Democrat.

That Road Tax Meeting

Scio, Or, Dec 31, 1912
To the Editor Santiam News,
Sir:—In your editorial of last week's issue I notice the following:

"It seems from reports that the road tax in Dist 15 was voted down by the country people," also that the townspeople were "willing to shoulder an additional burden for the sake of building good roads for the country people to travel."

Had you been able to attend this meeting you would probably agree that the responsibility for the defeat of the tax lies not so much with the country people as with the people of Scio who with a few exceptions remained away. Of the men actively engaged in business in the town, there were but two present, of professional men, none, and of the few other town people, not all voted favorably.

Two or three additional votes would have carried a motion for a special tax, half a dozen more would have passed the resolution carrying 7 mills.

As was well understood the main purpose of this meeting was to raise money to complete the road from Scio to the railway, a matter of more importance to the citizens of the town than to most of farmers of the district.

It would appear that the townspeople stayed away from the meeting to avoid sharing a burden to be borne, not for the country people, but for a purpose that virtually concerns every citizen of Scio who allows himself to be concerned by anything of a public nature.
