BOARD ELECTS OFFICERS

Linn County Fair Association Holds Annual Meeting in Scio January 11

At the annual meeting of the Linn County Fair Association held here last Saturday much important business was transacted. It was decided that all freight shipments will be received at West Scio and Munkers and transported to and from the fair grounds free of charge. This includes all manner of exhibits which can be crated or boxed properly, such as sheep, swine, goats and poultry. A competent man will be employed by the Association to take charge of the feeding and care for all livestock not accompanied by the owner or a caretaker. In the poultry department all fowls will be scored and in addition to the regular premiums offered a ribbon will be awarded on first, second and third, according to score.

Several important changes in the rules of the sheep and goat department were made. An elaborate race program will be made one of the features and many new free attractions will be secured. The fair will be held one week before the state fair, and ample time given exhibitors to attend both places.

D W Rumbaugh, county fruit inspector of Albany, spoke on the many fruit and garden pests, the proper manner to prevent and destroy them, the great importance of cleaning up the old infected orchards and the proper manner of securing first-class fruit and vegetables for exhibit purposes or for the market.

Superintendents: horses and cattle, J R Young, Thomas; sheep and goats, C H Waln, Thomas; swine, S Philippi, Scio; agriculture, D H Rumbaugh, Albany; poultry, Asa Hiron, Scio; ladies department, Mrs A G Prill and Mrs W F Gill, Scio; race department, E C Peery, Scio; school department, W L Jackson, Albany.

Mayor's Message

The following is a summary of the recommendations made by Mayor Cain in his annual message to the City Council:

The enlargement of the city water tank to hold at least ten thousand gallons of water.

The employment of a competent engineer to place the city streets and walks on a uniform grade and to make a chart of same for the city.

The grading and covering with crushed rock of Main street beginning at the intersection of North street and extending south to the bridge across Thomas creek.

The segregation of the light and water fund from the general fund. An arrangement by which the said light and water fund may be used by the city as a loan, the city paying an annual rate of six per cent interest for the use of said fund or any part thereof.

The setting aside as an annual allowance, not to exceed one-half mill of the regular tax levy, for the improvement of our city park and this allowance to be known and designated as the park fund.

The setting aside as an annual allowance, not to exceed one-half mill of the regular tax levy, for the maintenance and support of the fire department, and this allowance to be known and designated as fire department fund.

WANT BETTER SERVICE

Commercial Club to Petition Council for All Night Electric Light Service

The Commercial Club met at the City Hall Friday evening, January 10, with a scattering representation of business men and other citizens present.

Mr Peery deplored the fact that many of those who should be most interested in these meetings were not present.

It was recommended that the Club find out through the secretary the wishes of nearby towns in regard to a morning train to and evening train from Albany.

The good roads question came in for a share of attention and the point was brought out that a few cannot shoulder this burden, but it will take the combined action of all interested to secure good roads.

By motion Roberts rules of order was adopted as a guide for the club, and a committee consisting of Dr A G Prill and L W Charles was appointed to draft constitution and by-laws.

A booster envelope was offered by Dr Prill and adopted as official envelope for the club. It was recommended that all business houses be urged to use this envelope in their correspondence.

After some discussion along the line of an all night light service, it was voted that the club petition the city council for such a service. At present there are no lights from midnight until 4:30 a m.

Dr Prill urged that the business men take a more active interest in the county fair and make it a point to attend the meetings of the board of directors.

The meeting adjourned to meet at the same place, Friday evening January 17.
