At Regular Meeting of Commercial Club Last Friday Evening

At the regular meeting of the Commercial Club held last Friday evening several matters of importance were discussed.

A constitution and by laws were submitted and adopted.

Mayor Cain called attention to the fact that Scio has been without a harness shop for several months and that one would pay the owner without doubt, and would also be a convenience to the farmers in this vicinity. It was recommended that steps be taken toward inducing a first class harness maker to locate here.

On motion it was voted that the chair appoint a committee of two to go to Salem and interview the members of the legislature on measures before that body relative to county fairs, using their influence to secure the passage of a law granting to fairs already established, an annual appropriation. R M Cain and R Shelton were delegated to represent the Club in this matter.

Under the constitution adopted the regular meetings of the Club will be held the first and third Friday evenings of each month. Adjournment was taken until Friday evening, February 7.
