WON'T PAY CITY TAXES

T. A. Richardson and Others
File Injunction Against
City of Scio

A complaint was filed in the circuit court on January 21, asking for an injunction restraining the county clerk and sheriff from proceeding with the collection of taxes for city purposes in Scio.

The News has not attempted to interview those whose names are attached to the complaint, but some of them have informed us that their names were used without their knowledge or consent, as in fact they are in favor of the extension, which together with the old town, make the corporate limits one mile square.

The names attached to the complaint are as follows: T A Richardson, Jas Nemec, J F Prochaska, J A Wallace, V A Richardson, Mary Holub, J Smeltzer, T J Munkers, C S Browne, Minnie Young, M Mykol, Frank Shelton, Eliz Crabtree, J N Long, J W Compton, J F Wesely, J Kalina, Dean Morris, W G McDonald.

The Albany Herald of Jan 22, comments on the subject in part as follows: "From the complaint it appears that the city of Scio passed and adopted a new charter in 1911 and that the city limits as defined by the new charter include a large amount of land that was previously outside the corporation. The plaintiffs in this case own the land that was formerly outside the city limits and say that they had no notification of the election at which the charter was adopted nor had they any vote as to whether or not the change should be made. The court is asked to grant an injunction at once to restrain the county clerk from extending the tax rolls on the 1912 tax on the disputed land and also to restrain the sheriff from proceeding with the collection of the tax until the merits of the case can be threshed out in court."
