Mrs Mary E Rider died at the home of her daughter Mrs Ben P Taylor at Salem, Thursday, January 30, aged 71 years and 5 months.

The deceased was born in Ohio August 29, 1841, and was married to Rev Wm H Rider, May 24, 1860. From Ohio she and her husband moved to Missouri where they remained until after the Civil war when they moved to California. After a short stay there they came to Oregon, having resided at Roseburg, Stayton and Niagara, at last moving to Salem where she spent the remainder of her days. She was the mother of eight children, four of whom survive her, they are Mrs C A Bates of Scio, Mrs A M Brown, Independence, Mrs B P Taylor and U S Rider of Salem. Mrs Rider's was an exemplary life and her cheerful Christian spirit greatly endeared her to all who knew her. Funeral services were held at Salem Saturday.

The following letter from the Miller-Speer Lumber Co of Aumsville under date of Feb 1, is self-explanatory:

Dear Sir:—I am enclosing copy for a want ad which I would like to have you run for a short time.

We want to move our mill and enlarge it considerably, and have always looked upon Scio as a good location.

If everything is favorable we will put in a mill at Scio that will employ from 40 to 60 men, and a road to West Scio that will be suitable for commercial purposes. In connection with this we have planned a logging road first to the bluff upon which the H C Miller timber is located, then across to what is known as Rogers Bluff and from there to the timber proper.
