On motion it was ordered that the committee on municipal affairs meet with the city council in the interests of an all night light service.

It was recommended that the manufacturing committee confer with the Miller-Speer Lumber Co in regard to securing the location of their sawmill at Scio.

The committee on municipal affairs was directed to take steps toward securing a harness shop for Scio.

A resolution was passed recommending that the city ascertain the cost of establishing a power plant up Thomas creek a few miles above town, where light and water power suitable to our growing needs can be secured.

A committee consisting of R M Cain, Dr Prill and J S Sticha was appointed to confer with the county school superintendent and the Albany Commercial Club toward the end of securing their cooperation in having the industrial fair held at Scio in connection with the county fair.

A signal was adopted for calling members attention to the Commercial Club meetings, whereby the fire bell will be rung on meeting nights, two rings two times. Meeting adjourned to meet Friday evening, Feb 21.
