Under the new ruling of the postoffice department, which we received this week, the publisher must place a one-cent stamp on each paper which goes to a subscriber who is more than one year behind on his subscription, so if you are more than a year in arrears for the News this is the last paper you will receive unless you renew at once.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FAIR

Supt. Jackson in Letter Reviews Work of Last Year and Outlines Plan for Coming Fair—County Fair to Give \$600.00 in Prizes

To the Citizens of Linn County:

"Last year a large number of the boys and girls of the county, in addition to learning many valuable things in school, took an active part in the industrial contest in gardening, poultry, mechanical and industrial work in the home, encouraged through the school.

"As a result of their labor one of the best exhibits of its character, perhaps ever prepared in Linn County, was presented to the public. This work in many of the most progressive states has become part of the school system and has greatly increased the wealth of the state and the efficiency of its citizens.

"We can do the same in Oregon. Our past experience has been encouraging. However, we solicit the support of every citizen at this time, in the development of this work.

"It is evident that the prime object of this movement is to teach the rising generation to respect labor, to use their hands as well as their minds, to make practical application of the things learned in books and to become more useful men and women.

"In order to encourage this work at home, to bring the home and the school closer together and to lead them to appreciate country life, and believing that the country, especially Linn county, is one of the best places in the world for the boys and girls to reach the highest development, we are preparing to hold an industrial fair in connection with the Linn County Fair to be held the last week in September.

"At this fair the children may exhibit the best of what they have raised or made. The co-operation of the parent will help to solve the problem of finding profitable work for the town boy and girl as well as for the country children. A new feature of the fair this year is the prizes awarded for work done in the school, such as drawing and mechanical work, also prizes on each of the leading breeds of poultry.

"For the contest the children will be divided into two classes, those twelve years and older and those under twelve years of age. Three prizes will be offered on each product exhibited. The Linn County Fair Association has offered 1600 in cash prizes, and five thousand copies of the prize list now being printed, will be sent out to the schools in the near future. Several local fairs may be held prior to the county fair provided proper arrangements can be made.
