ENTHUSIASTIC BOOSTERS MEET

Messrs. Miller and Speer Both
Present—Sawmill Assured
if Scioans Will Help

The Commercial Club meeting last Friday evening was almost entirely given over to a discussion of ways and means of securing a sawmill for Scio, as Henry Miller and Mr Speer of the Miller-Speer Company, were both present.

About fifty members of the Club were in attendance and much interest was manifested. It is practically assured that the sawmill can be secured if our citizens do their part.

Briefly stated the proposition the Company had to offer the Club, as stated by Mr Speer, is as follows: They ask a 60 ft right of way from West Scio to the banks of Thomas creek above the condensery, and that the citizens of Scio grade the same in readiness for the ties. The estimated cost for 2 1-2 miles of track is about \$20,000. Of this sum the Miller-Speer Co will furnish about one-half, as well as the ties, the latter to be sawed here by the mill which is to be in operation before the construction of the track is begun.

It means much to Scio to secure this mill and behooves our citizens to do all in their power toward this end.

Mr Miller remarked that the Company would put in a mill somewhere this fall and prefer Scio to any other location.

The matter was left with the manufacturing committee to take such steps as they may see fit toward securing the right of way, etc.

The Club adjourned to meet Friday evening, March 7.

SPECIAL ROAD TAX INVALID

Lane Co. Case Decides Point
Which Affects Eight Linn
Co. Districts

Holding that the procedure under which all special road tax levies were made are invalid, the supreme court of Oregon Saturday handed down a decision which effects nearly every county in the state, says the Albany Democrat.

The case went up from Lane county on an appeal from the circuit court and has been under advisement for some time.

As soon as the decision reached Albany the matter was immediately called to the attention of District Attorney, Gale S Hill, and he and the county judge held a conference in regard to the matter Monday morning.

Eight districts in Linn county where a special road tax has been voted are affected by the new court decision and the county court may direct Sheriff Bodine to collect no further road taxes in these districts.
