**The Atom a Little Solar System.**  
There are thousands of substances, but all can be resolved into about eighty distinct elements—that is to say, substances whose molecules contain only one kind of atom and so cannot be further analyzed. A molecule is the smallest particle of a substance which exhibits the individuality of that substance. The atom, however, is not the smallest particle of matter of which we have cognizance. The most recent advances in radioactivity indicate that the atom in itself is a complex system consisting of a positively charged nucleus around which are grouped numerous negatively charged particles of infinitesimal dimensions called electrons. The electron is now described as the unit of the material universe, the basal ingredient underlying all forms of matter.—*Christian Herald.*
