## CONDENSERY TO START APRIL 1

Scio Milk Plant will be Ready for Business on That Date

The Scio Condensed Milk Co. will open their plant here for business about April 1. The work of putting the plant in order will commence the first of next week. They will begin operations this year with entirely new factory-management in the person of Riley Boyd, a competent process man of several years experience in one of the largest condensed milk plants of the state.

The recent passage of a condensed milk law for the state will enable the company to produce a high standard of condensed milk without being hampered by inferior brands which have heretofore flooded the market.

It is the purpose of the company to start with a limited amount of milk, gradually increasing the output as the demand grows. They expect a good support from the dairymen of this section, as they have always been able to show them a better profit for their milk than other buyers and at the same time save them the trouble and expense of using a separator. The plant will be under the same financial management as in the past.
