She was reared to womanhood in Trenton, New Jersey, and Brooklyn, N Y. She revisited the home land twice during her teens. She was married to Isaac C Bates, Jan 16, 1858, in Cordova, Ill; came to Denver, Colo by team in the early 60's. They came from Denver by ox team, arriving in Oregon Nov 16, 1864, and bought a farm of 280 acres 7 1/2 miles north of Scio, where they resided until five years ago, when declining health compelled them to retire from rural life and they secured a cottage home in Scio.

She leaves to mourn her loss her aged husband and six children, namely, Mrs H E Parrish, Lebanon; Mrs J B Jeter, Stayton; C A Bates, Shelburn; Mrs T J Nichols, Lebanon; Mrs J A Burton, Scio; D M Bates, Stayton. She was a member of the Catholic church at Scio.
