COMMISSIONERS INSPECT C. & E.

New Depot for Munkers Promised—Morning Train to Albany Asked For

Following a special meeting of the Commercial Club Monday evening, a committee consisting of E C Peery, R M Cain, Cal Carson and L W Charles went to Munkers Tuesday morning to lay our wishes before the railroad commissioners and S. P. officials who were viewing the C & E in a special train that day.

The committee asked for better depot accommodations at Munkers, which Mr Campbell, Supt of lines in Oregon, promised and said he would see to the matter personally. An additional train over the C & E to reach Albany in the morning and leave in the evening was asked for, and while no definite promises were made, Mr Campbell treated the committee very courteously and promised a thorough investigation of conditions, with a view of granting such service if the demand seems to warrant it.

An open meeting will be held at Scio in the near future at which time, John M Scott, General Passenger Agent of the S P Co, at least one of the railroad commissioners, and a delegation of the Albany Commercial Club will be present. The date of this meeting will be announced later. From present indications it seems very probable that we will soon have a morning train into the county seat.
