Capitalized at \$50,000—Articles Filed Tuesday at Co. Clerk's Office

For the purpose of buying and selling live stock, meats, fruits, hardware, dry goods, groceries, farm machinery, agricultural and dairy products, articles incorporating the Scio Mercantile Association at a capitalization of \$50,000, according to Wednesday's Democrat, were filed in the county clerk's office late Tuesday afternoon.

The principal office of the concern will be at Scio, and its duration will be for an unlimited period. The capital stock is divided into 5000 shares of par value of \$10 each and half of the number of shares are designated as preferred stock and the other half as common. A P Frawick, M D Good and C E Mann are the incorporators.
