In The Tomb

Mrs Sarah J Abbott, whose maiden name was Streithoff, was born in Hanover county, Pennsylvania, August 15, 1837, and died at her home at Scio, April 23, 1913, at the age of 75 years, 8 months and 8 days. When yet a small child her parents moved to Ohio, a few years later moving to Iowa. When she was 8 years old the family crossed the plains in wagons, coming to Oregon and located near what is now the town of Lebanon.

She was married to Edward Abbott, October 14, 1851. To this union 11 children were born, 5 of whom are living, William and James Abbott of Scio, Mrs Florence Caldwell of Jefferson, Mrs Jennie McClure of Sweet Home and Ira Abbott of Myrtle Point. Mrs Abbott was a member of the Presbyterian church, a true devoted Christian, a kind loving affectionate mother and a good neighbor. She leaves a large circle of relatives and friends in the community where most all her life was spent. That dear, sweet and precious name mother who never tired in the administration of care and attention to her dear ones and always had a pleasant smile and kind word to all, has now gone home to rest from the toils and cares incident to this life.

The following from the Portland Telegram of April 18, under a Sumpter date line, will be of interest to many Scioans, as it concerns Dr S C Browne, a former resident of this place, who is now superintendent of the Sumpter hospital: A new company was formed here this week with the object of dredging for gold in the headwaters of Granite creek seven miles west of Sumpter. It will be known as the Gold Center Dredge Co and the capital is \$100,000. Construction work will commence as soon as it is possible to get material on the ground. The personnel of the company will be Capt J P Wetherall pres, Dr S C Browne, sec and treas, and W S Weaver, mgr and supt.
