## MRS. BARTH ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Woman in Critical Condition From Self Inflicted Wound

Mrs. Fred Barth attempted to commit suicide last Sunday afternoon at their home one mile west of town.

Mr. Barth was at work hanging a door and his wife had been in the room with him chatting, and apparently feeling all right, about fifteen minutes before she shot herself.

She went into the bedroom and locked the door. Soon Mr. Barth was startled to hear a shot from the room. He broke down the door and found his wife trying to choke one of their children, a little tot about two years old. The weapon which she used was a 32-calibre revolver, which she placed in her mouth. The bullet broke out two teeth and shattered the jawbone, just missed her eye and lodged at the base of the brain.

Dr. Prill, the attending physician, states that the unfortunate woman has about one chance in a hundred to pull through. A particularly sad feature of the case is the fact that she expects to give birth to a child in about a month.

Her physical condition is thought to have unhinged her mind temporarily, which caused her to commit the rash act.

She was brought to town Monday and taken to the Parker home in the south part of town where everything possible is being done for her.
