NEW CONCRETE BUSINESS BLOCK

E. C. Peery and W. A. Ewing
Will Erect Modern Structures at Once

The work of tearing out the old buildings between the drug store and the bank will commence the first of next week, and two modern structures will be built at once, making a solid block.

E. C. Peery expects to erect a building of concrete blocks, 40x70, with a warehouse in the rear 30x43. W. A. Ewing will erect a building 26x50 adjoining, which will fill the intervening space between Mr. Peery's Building and the bank.

The buildings at the present on the ground are occupied by the postoffice; Eli Lulsenbach, shoemaker; Dr. Sanderson, dentist; Dr. Hobson, physician; Fred Ohlmeier, plumber, and R. Shelton, real estate. These tenants will scatter over town next week and hunt temporary quarters, before the work of dismantling the buildings commences.

The new structures are expected to be ready to occupy by September 1.

Letter from George Bilyeu

Mr. Pie Eater, as I and neighbor Filpot leave home this, the twelfth day of May, bound for eastern Oregon for Crook, Lake and Harney counties, I will write you regarding each day's travel as we go along. So here we start in boarding the train at Crabtree May 12, arriving in Portland at noon. Put in the afternoon riding on the electric cars and viewing the sights of Portland. The next morning we boarded the train for Bend, put in the day viewing the sights on the Columbia and the Deschutes rivers, arriving in Bend at 8:15. The next morning met J. H. Barber and made a deal with him to haul us around through the different parts of eastern Oregon.

We started from Bend on our journey through the high desert of Crook county, arriving at the George Millegan ranch where we stayed over night. The next morning we finished the high desert trip and came to the great Hampton valley which is a beautiful little valley, about 15 miles long and from three to four miles wide. We passed through this valley and stopped over night at the great Hampton store. We took up our journey the next morning bound for Lost Creek valley, arriving there in the evening and looking over the valley the next morning. Then started for the Silver Creek valley which is a very fine little place, dotted with little cabins of homesteaders and lots of sage brush and rabbits of which we had a lot of fun shooting and chasing them.

On leaving here we struck the great Harney valley which is 80 miles in length and 60 miles in width. We looked this valley over and sized up the town of Burns, which is situated at the head of Harney valley. After we had sized the place up we decided to return homeward as we are tired of traveling, and disgusted with the country as it is cold and frosty at nights, windy days and lots of sand flying.

What good would advertising do a business with poor goods and dummy salesmen? That is poor merchandising. But good merchandising and good advertising combined is a sure winner, and is more valuable than bank stock. The merchant who handles a good quality of goods, has a good selling force, and through judicious advertising in his local paper proclaims the merits of his goods, seldom meets with disappointment in his business. He conducts his business a little bit better than his neighbor. And Emerson referred to the merchant as well as anyone else when he said, "If a man can write a better book, preach a better sermon, or make a better mouse trap than his neighbor, though he build his house in the woods, the world will make a beaten track to his door." The beaten track will follow in the wake of good advertising and good merchandising. It always has as any merchant prince will certify.
