MORNING TRAIN INTO ALBANY

EFFORTS OF SCIO COM- MERCIAL CLUB BEAR FRUIT

A telegram from John M. Scott to the Scio Commercial Club states that a motor train service from Mill City to Albany and return is under consideration to go into effect at once. The train is scheduled to leave Mill City at 6:15 in the morning and returning will leave Albany about 5:30 in the evening.

This is due to the efforts of the Scio Commercial Club, it having succeeded in securing a hearing of the Southern Pacific officials and the Oregon Railroad Commission at Scio some two months ago.

New Postal Laws

Parcel post, special delivery and registered stamps have been abolished and the little red and green stickers such as everyone uses to send letters and post cards are good for everything that Uncle Sam can give in the line of postal service, according to an order from Postmaster-General Burleson, which took effect July 1.

For the purpose of simplifying the postal service and making it easier for everyone to transact business with the postoffice department, is the reason given for establishing a one-stamp system. An ordinary postage stamp can now be used for special delivery, registered mail or parcel post, and the parcel post stamps, so long as they last, are good on letters or other mail matter. These special stamps will be sold until the supply runs out.

Effective on August 15, the parcel post rate in the first zone, now known as the first and second zones, will be five cents for the first pound and one cent for each additional two pounds. The weight limit has been raised from 11 pounds to 20 pounds.

LAW OF OREGON

No bovine animal over one year of age shall be exhibited at a state, district or county fair within the state of Oregon unless within twelve months prior to such exhibit, it has been subjected to a tuberculin test and received a certificate of health from a qualified veterinarian.

No entry for exhibition shall be received until such certificate has been filed. Penalty is a fine of \$50. to \$250.

Exhibitors of the Linn County Fair will please notify the secretary at once of their intention to exhibit so that arrangements may be made to comply with the law as above given.
