Another old pioneer has gone to rest. Rose Anne Autle was born in Keokuk county Iowa in 1849, crossing the plains in 1865 with her parents, coming to Oregon by wagon. She married J D Layton July 28, 1867. They made their home in Albany for a short time, then moving to southern Oregon where they lived a short time, when they again returned to Albany and located on a farm two miles northwest of Lacombe where they lived for 35 years. Having concluded to try city life again, they sold their farm and moved to Independence where Mr Layton engaged in the livery business for two years, but wishing to try farming again they sold their livery business and bought a farm near Suver, in Polk county where they lived at the time of Mrs Layton's death. She was operated on at St Marys hospital at Albany on Sept 23 and was doing nicely until Sunday night when she grew worse and died at 11 p m September 28. Besides the husband left to mourn the loss of his life time helpmate and devoted wife, there are nine children: Mrs Ollie Deakins of Lacombe, Art Layton of Algona, Wash; Ernest Layton of Salubria, Idaho; Mrs Flo Vanbheren of Aumsville; Mrs Viola Paul and Mrs Stella Flanagan of Crabtree; Mrs Grace Hassler of Bend, Mrs Susie Hodges and Roy Layton of Suver. Guss Layton, the oldest son lost his life in a hotel fire at Couer d'Alene, Ida., about five years ago. Mrs Layton was a kind and loving mother and leaves a large circle of friends and neighbors to join the husband and children in mourning the loss of one so well known as she. The funeral was held at 11 a m Sept 30 at Providence church where she was laid to rest by the side of her father and mother. The services were conducted by the Baptist minister of Lebanon.
