home in Scio November 12, 1913, after
several weeks' illness.

vives him. Nine children were born

anek, Lettber, South Dakota, and
Mrs. J. F. Wesely and J. S. Sticha, of
Scio.

Mr. Sticha moved to Scio in 1904,
where he resided until his death. He
was a kind and loving husband and
father, a good neighbor and a true
friend.

The funeral services were conducted
last Thursday afternoon by Father
Clancy of Albany, and interment was
made in the Franklin Butte cemetery.
