After the battle of Gettysburg in 1863, President Lincoln recommended the people to set apart the 6th day of August "to be observed as a day of national thanksgiving, praise and prayer to Almighty God." In the following year the President issued another proclamation, and the presidential proclamation has been an annual fixture ever since.

Those whose lives are the easiest and pleasantest are often singularly forgetful of grateful ascription to the source of blessings. Thanksgiving day was not instituted by a people surrounded by comforts and luxuries, but who turned their hearts to God in the midst of hardships of which their descendants scarcely comprehend the meaning.

The establishment of a day of thanksgiving in the late autumn, after the gathering of the fruits, was made by the early settlers of New England, in imitation of the feast of tabernacles held by the Jewish nation. It was a wise and pious act, and its adoption by most of the states and at length by the general government of this broad land is an evidence of the diffusion of those religious sentiments which were at the foundation of the settlement of this country.

Congress recommended days of thanksgiving annually during the Revolution and Washington, in 1829, after the adoption of the constitution. Other days of national thanksgiving have been proclaimed, and since 1863 the last Thursday in November has been annually proclaimed by the president as a national Thanksgiving Day.
