The blueness of sea water is in
constant ratio to its saltiness. In
the tropics the tremendous evapora-
tion induced by the blazing sun
causes the water to be much saltier
than it is in higher latitudes. For
about 30 degrees north and south
of the equator the waters are of an
exquisite azure. Beyond these lati-
tudes the blue changes to green,
and in the arctic and antarctic
oceans the greens are almost as
vivid as the tropical blues.
