Suppose there were two stores side by side, selling the same kind of goods, one store open for business all the time while the other store was open for business occasionally—other things being equal, which store would get the business? Suppose there were two parallel railroads between objective points, one road running trains on schedule time while the other road only ran trains occasionally—which road would get the travel? The answer to each question is obvious.
